7TH AND 8TH GRADE

INTRODUCTION:

You are a writer. You are an inventor. You are a scientist. You are an innovator. You are a gamer. You may be young but you are incredibly smart and infinitely curious. You are almost in high school and you show so much potential. In order to harness your stellar intelligence and creativity, you are going to keep a personal journal this summer. This journal will house all of your curiosities, stories, and insights. It will be a place for you to think, reflect, create, and be yourself. The outside of your journal should be a representation of who you are, what you like, and where you are headed in life. The inside of your journal will contain both literary and creative journal entires.

ASSIGNMENT/INSTRUCTIONS:

- You should choose the journal prompts that excite and **interest** you the most.
- Each of your responses should be 1-2 paragraphs of about 100-200 words.
- Incoming 7th Graders are expected to respond to at least 5 journal prompts.
- Incoming 8th Graders are expected to respond to at least 6 journal prompts.
- The journal prompts are meant to inspire you to be **creative!**

RUBRIC/GRADING CHECKLIST

1. Each response has a heading that contains the date and the name of the journal prompt/10
2. All journal responses are 1-2 paragraphs in length or 100-200 words/10
3. Journal entries show creativity and effort. /10
4. The complete journal is turned in on the FIRST day of school with the student's name and grade visible to the teacher/10
5. The outside of the journal (be it simple, unique, extravagant, store-bought, or hand made) should reflect the personality of the individual writer. Be Creative!/10

JOURNAL PROMPT "MENU"

- Go outside, pick a colorful item, tape it to a page in your journal, and write a poem, descriptive paragraph, or short story about the item.
- Describe your most recent summer adventure.
- If you could live without one of your senses, which would you choose and why?
- What did you do today? Describe everything in extreme detail.
- Tape and ordinary object to a page in your journal and create a myth about how it may have been invented.
- Place an actual keepsake or item that represents an experience from this summer that you want to remember (tickets to a concert or movie you really enjoyed, a shell from a beach you visited, etc.) and write about why you like it and want to remember that time or experience.
- Play your favorite song and draw a picture, or write a poem or story as you listen to it. Let the words and sounds inspire you.
- Write a journal entry from the point of view of an inanimate object, like dollar bill, coin, rock, or lost tennis ball. Follow its journey as it passes through multiple hands, machines, pockets, wallets, bags.
- Pretend you are a cartoon character or super hero and design a comic strip that tells the story of your day, your week, your summer, or your life.
- Write your own journal prompt, ask a parent or friend to give you a journal prompt, or research a fun journal prompt on your own!

Reading and writing over the summer is an EXCELLENT way to maintain your skills! Journaling can be a great outlet for creative expression, awesome ideas and special memories. Please feel free to do more than what is asked of you. Go above and beyond! Be creative? Once you've finished your required responses....challenge yourself to continue journaling! Make your journal into something you enjoy reading....allow it to be something you enjoy working on....create it to be a true expression of YOU! Most of all, have fun with it!

Our math program allows you to move at your own pace through the Common Core Standards throughout the year. In order to continue this individualized structure over the summer, we are requiring you to independently complete, at least, the first unit in our online program, School21. The first unit is a review of material covered in the previous year. These topics should be familiar to you, and there are plenty of instructional videos and links provided on School21 to provide you with a "refresher course", if necessary.

You are required to keep an organized notebook as described in the attached notebook handout. For those students who have already begun working on School21 at the next grade level, you should complete the next unit in sequential order.

Working with Numbers (all topics)

If you are working at an advanced pace and have already begun the next grade's curriculum, please see us if you have any questions about which unit you should complete over the summer.

Although not mandatory, OLG summer school (Period 1 "Pre-Algebra") is highly recommend for all junior high students, especially incoming 6th graders, to work through the topics in a classroom environment. This summer school class is structured very similarly to math class during the school year will help students to successfully transition to the next grade.
